and writing about the horrible circumstances that harmed his family. He speaks with great candor about the events of that fateful day. He has appeared at hospitals, medical conferences, churches and meetings of various professional health organizations from coast-to-coast. His story has been published in numerous magazines and medical publications, and was also told in great detail with the long-awaited release of his book, "Twist of Faith." Ridley's story is one of hope, healing and forgiveness and a call for continued improvement in patient safety. He lives today with his wife, Lisa, and their 4 children in Thompson's Station, Tenn.



Spence Byrum

As a former pilot and safety officer for the U.S. Coast Guard as well as a process improvement expert, Spence Byrum has studied the inevitability of human error, why it occurs and how it can be prevented. As co-

founder and CEO of HRS (High Reliability Solutions) Consulting in Weston, Fla., he has helped more than 600 healthcare facilities implement the protocols and practices of commercial aviation, nuclear power plants and other high reliability organizations in order to protect patients from harm when human error occurs.



Carol Cappella, RN, MSN, CNOR

Carol Cappella is the clinical director of the Delray Beach (Fla.) Surgery Center. She has more than 30 years of experience in acute care hospitals and health systems, including 20 years in leadership roles. She was

Beth Chrismer was executive director for risk management at Good Shepherd Medical Center in Longview, Texas, when a patient's rampaging son unexplainably stabbed 5 people, killing 1 OR nurse and

1 visitor, at its ambulatory surgical center in November 2013. Ms. Chrismer has since spoken frequently on armed violence in the healthcare setting. She has more than 35 years of experience in healthcare, including 15 years in healthcare risk management. She is also a certified yoga teacher.



Vangie Dennis, BSN, RN, CNOR, CMLSO

Vangie Dennis is the director of patient care practice at the Emory Clinics Ambulatory Surgery Centers in Atlanta, Ga., as well as the laser safety officer for the Emory Health System. With more than 40 years of nursing

experience, she has lectured nationally and internationally on clinical practices, advanced technologies, endoscopic procedures and surgical laser use. In 2011, she received the AORN Award for Outstanding Achievement in Perioperative Clinical Nursing Education. Ms. Dennis is a longtime member of the *Outpatient Surgery Magazine* Editorial Board.
